WATER LETTUCE (Pistia stratiotes) invades Schuylkill Canal



Water lettuce (*Pistia stratiotes*) is an invasive plant that has overtaken the lower part of the Schuylkill Canal during the warmer months. This weed s a freefloating, stoloniferous plant with rosettes of leaves that resembles a head of lettuce. First noticed this summer, it rapidly spread from the downstream end of the canal to the Port Providence spillway.

- This weed reproduces into a dense mat that clogs the waterway. It is difficult to eradicate because it mixes in with native vegetation along the banks and it is a prolific seed producer with a highly viable seed.
- The Schuylkill Canal Association (SCA) held two volunteer events last summer, removing over 60 pickup trucks of the weed and disposed it at the Upper Providence Township composting facility.



It is anticipated that control measures will be long-term. The SCA is developing a maintenance program and identifying partners to help remedy the problem. At least TWO volunteer removal events will be held 2017. Check out <u>http://schuylkillcanal.org</u> for more information.
